During their tenure, they made hundreds of therapeutic visits with local program partners including visiting clients at The Exceptional Foundation, participating in the Pawsitive Living program with Glenwood Inc, and visiting patients in UAB's Emergency Room. Duke's favorite place to visit, however, was at Children's of Alabama. In his prime, Duke and Carol would visit the patients and staff every single week, providing moments of comfort and joy during extremely difficult times.

Duke and Carol made a huge "pawprint" at Children's of Alabama over the years, and the Child Life Specialists knew they wanted to do something special to honor and thank them for their volunteer service. Courtney Wells, a Child Life Specialist who had worked closely with Duke and Carol in the ER, orchestrated the retirement party.
